


Survey Summary


- The community survey was conducted in March of 2017.

- Total responses = 1,684 (739 paper)
- Participation rate = 21%


What is your age?




Do you live in the School District of Reedsburg?




In which municipality do you reside?




Are you an employee of the School District of Reedsburg?




Do you have child(ren) attending school in the District?

Background Information

The School Board has identified the following factors as they consider all long-range facility options:

Debt Reduction

This spring, the District is paying off a loan that provided funds to build the Reedsburg Area High School. This gives the community an opportunity to **borrow up to \$30 million to make facility upgrades with no tax increase over the current debt payment level**.

Improve School Security

The safety of our students and staff is our top priority. Several of our schools lack a properly secured building entrance. There is a need to reconfigure these entrances and move the school offices to the main entrance to better monitor and control visitor access to our facilities.

Elementary Capacity


Each elementary school located inside the Reedsburg city limits is currently operating over capacity, creating operational challenges for these schools. To help address this issue, students from the city of Reedsburg are bused to Loganville and Ironton-LaValle Elementary Schools, where space is available.

Cost Effectiveness

The District continually strives to improve operational efficiencies. One of the fundamental challenges is that the District has five elementary schools. Smaller schools tend to be more expensive to operate on a per-student basis. Most districts our size would operate with two or three elementary schools.


Update Building Infrastructure

Some building systems, including heating, cooling, electrical and plumbing, are approaching the end of their service life. These older systems are less efficient and require ongoing repairs. In addition, many of the schools' roofs, interior finishes, including flooring, ceiling tiles, lighting and cabinetry need to be replaced. Many of these expenses are too large to address within our annual operating budget.






Loganville Elementary School




Pineview Elementary




Westside Elementary

- Build a gym to provide additional space for physical education classes and renovate the current gym into a dedicated cafeteria



South Elementary School





Would you support a referendum to build a new elementary school? (All Residents)





Would you support a referendum to build a new elementary school? (Staff Residents)





The School Board believes this is a good time to consider our options given the District's healthy financial situation and historically low interest rates. Voters would need to approve a referendum to pay for major renovations and facility upgrades.


The cost to address all the projects included in this survey would be up to \$63 million. We realize that given this cost, it may not be realistic to complete all of these projects at one time. Therefore, we may have to complete the projects in phases, based on the priorities of the community and their willingness to financially support the projects.


Assumptions: Tax impacts assume issuing bonds with interest rates of 4.00%-4.50%.
